WARMINSTER TOWNSHIP ONLINE ORDINANCES

Did you know that all of our ordinances are codified and online for all to see? Warminster uses eCode 360 to publish and maintain all of our ordinances. The ordinances are organized by chapter and are both searchable and printable. New ordinances are added upon adoption. You can find them by visiting the Township website, under the Resources tab. You can also download an app to have them available whenever you're on the go.

Warminster Township Zoning Ordinance

At their May 7th, 2020 meeting, the Warminster Township Board of Supervisors adopted Ordinance 762 Amending the Zoning Ordinance. Several major changes were made to the ordinance to address ongoing concerns residents had under the 2009 code. These changes included provisions for residents to raise chickens on their property, a relaxing of the recreational vehicle parking regulations, changes to setbacks for accessory structures on a property, and general cleanup of code items.

Residents are asked to contact the Zoning Officer if they are interested in maintaining chickens on their property as there are specific regulations related to the number of chickens, size of the coop, fencing area, and general care and maintenance of the chickens. A Zoning permit is required for the chickens and associated structures.

Residents wishing to park their recreational vehicles on their property are reminded that they may have no more than two recreational vehicles located on the exterior of the property, the recreational vehicle must be at least five (5) feet off of their rear or side yard property line and any vehicle parked in the front yard, must be fully in the front yard and on a paved or packed stone surface. Recreational vehicles parked in the front yard may not interfere with the sight lines for ingress or egress of the owner's property and those adjacent to it.

WASTE & RECYCLING COLLECTION INFORMATION

TRASH COLLECTION: To collect trash & recyclables more efficiently, J.P. Mascaro & Sons, the contracted trash removal service for Warminster Township, has broken the Township into eight sections. Visit: **warminstertownship.org/trash-information** to view a map and find out when your trash collection day is, what to do with bulk items, how to recycle e-waste and more!

YARD WASTE, GRASS AND LEAVES will be picked up once per week from April 1st to December 15th each year. December 16th through March 31st put them in the regular trash.

The Township has **SINGLE STREAM RECYCLING** which allows residents to place all recyclables: cans, bottles and plastics, newspapers, cardboard, and mixed paper in one container. For more information on trash collection services, please call J.P. Mascaro with questions: 1-800-432-1616




FLEXIBLE PLASTIC PACKAGING COLLECTION: J.P. Mascaro will now be accepting flexible plastic packaging for recycling. This includes items such as grocery bags, retail bags, bubble wrap, cereal bags, food storage bags and more. Packaging must be empty, clean, and dry before being placed in the curbside cart. E-WASTE (electrical and electronic waste): TV's, computers, cell phones, battery backups, and small appliances with a cord, are a valuable source of secondary raw materials but are also toxic if disposed of improperly. Hazardous Wastes are not permitted in the trash. Car batteries, gasoline, motor oil, pesticides, oil-based paint and other toxic and hazardous materials do not belong in the trash or down the drain!

PARKS PLAY AN IMPORTANT ROLE DURING THE PANDEMIC

Covid-19 continues to create challenges for everyone, but the one saving grace is that our municipal park system remains available to all area residents throughout the pandemic. It has brought to light just how important recreation opportunities and the natural environment are to the health and wellbeing of all our park users. We have observed a dramatic increase in the use of parks, trails and recreation facilities. Parks have become places where people can enjoy the natural environment to reduce anxiety and stress and burn off excess energy while gyms are closed. With more than 410 municipal acres, which includes neighborhood parks as well as regional destinations, residents have been able to social distance while enjoying nature and getting exercise. "The National Recreation and Park Association surveyed Americans to see how essential they felt parks, trails and open spaces are during the COVID-19 pandemic. The survey revealed that 83% of U.S. adults agreed that visiting their local parks, trails and open spaces is essential for their mental and physical well-being during the COVID-19 ordeal".

As we move into a fall/winter season with so many unknowns, we will continue to try to offer some of our most popular programs and events, but restrictions may cause some additional cancellations. Some of our events have gone virtual and others have moved outside. To stay up to date and explore more options, we recommend that you subscribe to the township email. Also, check out the Warminster Free Library, Doylestown Health and the PSU Extension Service websites as they provide many virtual educational and free webinar programs. Please be assured that we will continue working to keep the members of the community active, happy and healthy. 

SPOTTED LANTERN FLY EMERALD ASH BORER (EAB) UPDATE

The Spotted Lantern Fly has arrived with a vengeance in the Central Bucks County area. Nymphs in the two stages prior to adulthood were everywhere this summer. If you see them, kill them, but they are really quick to move! Although Ailanthus trees are their favorite, we also saw them on fruit trees, grape vines, willow, silver maple, ash and redbuds. While we tried to control the invasion in park lands with systemic spraying, each homeowner must address their personal property.



At this point, SLF is too widespread for complete control. As fall/winter approaches, the adults will begin laying eggs. Egg casings on trees can be scraped off and scientists are working on ways to control this invasive moth, possibly with a fungus or herbicide, before more trees and orchards are affected. In addition, the Emerald Ash Borer continues to affect local ash trees and we recommend that you closely watch the trees on your property. Tree services may be able to climb trees for removal if the trees are not totally dead, thus saving the homeowner removal costs.

PARK GRANT UPDATE

The Parks & Recreation Department has secured almost \$3 million in development and improvement grants in Warminster Community Park. These funds come from several sources – Bucks County Municipal Open Space Fund; Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) Community Conservation Partnerships Program; the PA Office of the Budget's Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program and donations from developers and organizations. Improvements originally included a soccer field, baseball fields; a splashpad, pavilion with restrooms, expanded parking, new trails, storm water management, opening a permanent entrance at Bristol Road, and an extension of the existing driveway from Veterans Way into the park.

The bids were first publicly advertised over the winter and opened on March 26, 2020. were well over our available funding, and, at the recommendation of Township staff and professionals, the Board of Supervisors rejected them. After several weeks of reviewing and revising the specifications by moving some items from the base bid and classifying them as options, the project was re-bid. The new bids were opened on July 27 and were also higher than the estimates. At the time of this writing, staff is reviewing them to determine which options should be removed or added before making a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors for awarding them. Once the bids are awarded, contracts and other documents need to be prepared and approved by all parties. We still anticipate that work will begin in the fall.

Once construction is underway, residents should be aware that the development of these new facilities in the park may limit access to certain areas where work is being performed, but we will make every effort to have all sections of the park open as safety permits.

Although the delays associated with this project have been frustrating, they are not unusual for work of this scope that is using multiple funding sources. We are optimistic that when they are completed, our new facilities will be worth the wait!

TREE CHIPPING PROGRAM

Don't forget about our Christmas Tree Chipping Program. Recycle your Christmas tree after the holidays. Parks & Recreation will chip it and use chips for park trails. If we get a huge pile, residents are welcome to take some home for your garden. Don't forget to remove decorations before dropping off. Drop off trees at WCP in the designated area of the parking lot from December 26, 2020 to January 31, 2021.

IN THE PARKS



COVID-19 NOTE: Park visitors are asked to follow all CDC, Federal, State and local guidelines for Covid-19. We recommend that you continue to wear a mask, social distance, stay home if sick, and wash or sanitize hands frequently. Please be aware that equipment, play areas, and picnic tables are not sanitized.

Park restrooms, when open, are cleaned once daily.

- Parks are open from sunrise to sunset. After dusk, you must have a permit or risk being fined.
- Parks are officially closed during winter weather conditions. Park
 parking lots, paths and trails and facilities are not maintained and
 may remain snow and ice covered for extended periods. Surfaces
 may be slippery. Guests may still access parks for winter recreational
 activities; however, they do so at their own peril. Anti-slip winter
 footwear is recommended.
- All Park buildings are winterized annually (restrooms closed; water/ electric shut off) by December 1 to reduce the chance of frozen pipes.
 Porta-potties will be removed from Munro in December, but one will remain on site at WCP & Kemper. Weather permitting; buildings should reopen by April 1.
- Sport fields in all parks are available by permit only. Persons who
 wish to use pavilions & fields should apply for permits. Warminster
 youth organizations and permit holders have priority.
- Park facilities are available for special events, parties, family picnics
 and business gatherings for a reasonable fee. Dates are filling
 quickly for 2020/2021, so please reserve your pavilion or fields by
 completing a facility request permit and submitting it to the Parks
 & Recreation Dept. Forms can be downloaded at the website: www.
 warminstertownship.org.
- To reduce vandalism, park facilities are locked unless park staff or sport organizations are utilizing a park. If you see vandalism, dumping or other hazards, DON'T WAIT!! Please call the Police Department immediately at (215) 672-1000.

- Please do not feed the wildlife, especially the fox, deer and geese, in the parks - supplemental feeding encourages wildlife to lose their fear of people and become dependent on handouts that are not part of their natural diets.
- If you see people with their dogs running loose, please call the Animal Control Officer (267) 317-8085 or Police (215) 672-1000. Do not try to intervene and put yourself in harm's way.
- Solicitation by vendors, including private fitness or sport instruction, is not permitted in any park. Citations will be issued by the Police Department. Permits are available for a fee.
- Motorized vehicles, including dirt bikes and ATVs are not permitted in Township parks.
- Cyclists must yield to pedestrians on all park trails. Warn pedestrians by loudly declaring "cyclist on your left" prior to passing.
- Perennials for Parks if you are dividing your perennials in spring or fall, why not donate the "discards" to the parks to improve our park landscaping. Contact the office for more info: 215-443-5428.
- Park encroachment If your residence backs up to a park, please
 be aware of your property boundaries before installing sheds,
 pools and play equipment. Items that encroach on park land must
 be removed at the cost of the homeowner no matter how long
 they have been in place.
- No dumping reminder dumping in the parks or public lands is illegal. Leaves, trees, limbs, trimmings and other yard waste must be removed and disposed of properly through the trash company.
- Commemorative benches and trees honoring friends, family, pets and others are available for placement in any Township park.

DOG LICENSES REQUIRED

• According to Pennsylvania State Law, all dogs three (3) months of age or older must have a current dog license and a current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian. Dog licenses may be purchased at the WREC, Mon thru Fri from 9 AM-4 PM, at Bucks County Treasurer's office in Doylestown-(215) 348-6244, or online at www.padoglicense.com. You must provide proof of spaying to receive the discount.

NOISE ORDINANCE

- Pet owners should be aware that Warminster Township has an ordinance in place regarding un-provoked incessant noise made by animals***. For more info regarding this and other Pennsylvania State Dog Laws, contact Craig Claycomb, Animal Control Officer (267) 317-1380.
- Violators are subject to a \$100-\$500 fine for non-compliance

POOPER-SCOOPER ORDINANCE

• Pet owners are required to clean up after their animals, not only in the parks, but on all public and private property throughout the Township (Ordinance #565) or face the possibility of a fine up to \$1,000.







Permits are required for a variety of residential and commercial improvements. Prior to starting your project, please contact the Licenses and Inspections Department for review and approval. Items like fences, sheds, renovations, signs, pools, etc., all require permits.

POOL GUIDELINES

- In Warminster Township, the following criteria shall apply to the construction of an above or in-ground pool. A pool is defined as any pool/container (spa, fish pond, etc.) that can hold more than twenty-four (24) inch of water.
- Barrier fencing is required when a pool permit is issued.
- An Earth Disturbance Permit is required for disturbances greater than 1,000 square feet.
- The Township has four (4) different pool permits; above ground and in-ground for a pool proposed within the Little Neshaminy Creek Watershed and an above ground and in-ground for a pool proposed within the Pennypack Creek Watershed. All permits are available on the Township web site.
- In-ground pool plans, and the electrical plans must be signed and sealed by a professional engineer or surveyor.
- Manufacturer's specifications are required for pool heaters.
- Impervious surface calculations are required, but the water surface of the pool is not an impervious surface. Please be sure to complete the Impervious Surface Calculation Worksheet.
- Stormwater Planting Agreement is required for properties located in the Little Neshaminy Watershed where there is an increase in the impervious coverage.
- A pool and pool equipment must be located a minimum ten (10) feet behind the rear-most portion of the dwelling and ten (10) feet from any side or rear property line.

ROAD PROJECTS IN THE WORK!

Following the 5-year Road Improvement Plan, sector 2 has been targeted for road resurfacing in 2020. Fourteen roads in the southern central area of the Township have been resurfaced including Coronet Rd, Windsor Rd, Victoria Rd, Riviera Rd, Dogwood Rd, Parry Rd, Poplar Rd, Hickory Rd, Birch Rd, Catalpa Rd, Hemlock Rd, Wisteria Rd, Walnut Rd, and Pine Rd. As required by Federal mandate, 62 ADA compliant curb ramps have also

been constructed in this neighborhood. Copies of the 5 year plan are available to residents by contacting the Public Works Department at 267-317-1310 or by emailing Eric Hinz, Public Works Director, at ehinz@warminsterpa.org.

FALLING LEAVES . . . Yard Waste Ordinance #537

With fall upon us, the Public Works department asks that residents work with us to keep our storm drains, creeks, and basins free of yard debris. Leaves are the number one cause of storm drain blockages and could cause flooding and property damage. Problems with neighborhood flooding prompted the Board of Supervisors to pass an ordinance to not permit yard waste and debris in the street gutters. To help keep our sewer and storm water management system flowing, please be sure that neither you, nor your lawn care contractor, blow clippings, leaves, etc. into the street or you may be fined. All yard waste should be placed in paper bags or at cans at the curb. Reminder...If you back up to a park or open space, leaves should still be bagged and put out at the curb, not piled in the woods or along the creek.



COMMUNITY STORMWATER INFORMATION

Storm water runoff is responsible for up to 70% of the pollution found in our streams, lakes and rivers. Impervious surfaces (ones that do not allow water to penetrate the ground) such as buildings and parking lots contribute substantial amounts of water to our storm drains. This water often contains many pollutants. REMEMBER: The Warminster Township storm drain system does not provide any treatment for the removal of pollutants; anything that enters the system eventually reaches our waterways.



- 1. **Don't dump anything into storm drains**—dispose of hazardous waste through Bucks County's hazardous waste collection days.
- 2. If you see a **suspicious discharge** to a water body or storm drain (catch basin, slotted manhole, into the street), contact Warminster Township Public Works at 267-317-1310.
- 3. **Personal property** shall not be connected to the storm drain system (i.e. laundry hookups, sump pumps or septic systems). Such connections are prohibited in Warminster Township.
- 4. **Divert runoff** from pavement to grassy, planted, or wooded areas of your property.
- 5. Pick up litter or pet waste waste ends up in our streams either directly or through storm drains.
- 6. **Reduce fertilizer and pesticide use or toxicity.** When mowing the lawn, mulch lawn clippings to provide a natural fertilizer.
- 7. **When watering your lawn, don't over-spray**. Water that runs off sidewalks and roadways carries contaminants (oil, grease, and metals) into the drain system.
- 8. When washing your car, use phosphate free, non-petroleum-based cleaning agents.
- 9. Sweep up salt and sand on your walkways after snowmelt. Don't hose down driveways or sidewalks.
- 10. Inspect your vehicles & equipment for leaking and damaged parts.

WINTER REMINDER

With winter fast approaching, the Township hopes that all residents will assist with keeping streets clear so that plows can move unwanted snow.

- Ordinance #625 states that it is unlawful for residents to park vehicles on any road following accumulation of 3" or more of snow/ice until snow/ice has been completely plowed from the full width of the roadway. Please move cars off the streets when it starts to snow, so that the Township can more effectively and safely remove the snow/ice. Snow Emergencies will be declared when snow is forecasted to reach 3 inches or more, or accumulating ice requires that the streets be cleared. Snow Emergency declarations will be posted in advance on the Township website at www.warminstertownship.org.
- It is unlawful to shovel, push, plow or otherwise cause snow to be placed onto, across, or upon any roads, streets or sidewalks if the snow is allowed to remain on the road, street, sidewalk or right-of-way.
- When the Township plows the roads, the plowing causes the snow to get pushed up to driveways, curbs, and sidewalks.
 It may be more convenient for homeowners to shovel after the Township plows the roads as opposed to prior.
- Please trim back all trees, branches and bushes along your front curb line and at corners to help improve road conditions and allow for emergency vehicle access.
- Remember to keep all trash cans out of the street. Portable basketball nets in the street are considered a traffic obstruction and owners may be cited. Please move them back off the street when not in play. If they are struck during emergency services or snow plowing, the owner is responsible for all damages.
- Warminster Township is not responsible for replacing mailboxes located in the right of way that are damaged during snow plowing. To avoid snowplow damage to your mailbox, any person with a mailbox located along the street should be sure that the mailbox is secure in the ground.
- The Township is divided into grids for snowplowing. Some areas have been bid out to local contractors to aid our Public Works Department in plowing snow.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK - OCTOBER 4-10: "SERVE UP FIRE SAFETY in the KITCHEN"

Since 2014 in Warminster Township:

- 29 or 17% of all serious fires occurred in the kitchen
- 11 of these fires were due to unattended cooking
- 18 of these fires involved preparation or items too close to the stove
- Of these kitchen fires, there were 2 fatalities, 1 injury, and \$1.4 million in damages.

How do you protect yourself?

- · Keep a close eye on what you're cooking; never leave cooking unattended
- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains at least three feet away from your stovetop.
- Be on alert. If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol, don't use the oven or stovetop.
- Visit our website for up to date fire safety messages.



The most dangerous part of any fire is the smoke. This is why working smoke detectors are an essential tool needed to give you and your family early warning of a fire. You need to have a smoke detector on every level and each bedroom. The best protection is an interconnected smoke detector system. New technologies allow smoke detectors to be connected WIRELESSLY! A smoke detector that is activated in the basement or distant part of your house will activate all smoke detectors in the house. This will give you valuable seconds to escape.

PRACTICE YOUR ESCAPE PLAN

Fire Drills are not just for school students! Businesses practice them for the safety of their employees; you should plan and practice an escape plan for your family. When you are in an emergency there is no time to panic, seconds count. Plan and practice how you will get out of your home, a secondary way out, and a safe place to meet.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE - ADDRESS

This is hard to read. How will an Ambulance find your house? How can a police officer respond to your call? Your ADDRESS NEEDS to be clearly visible from the street, in number form, at least 4" high, and in a contrasting color from the background. Help us find you.



What you should know about COVID-19 to protect yourself and others



Know about COVID-19

- Coronavirus (COVID-19) is an illness caused by a virus that can spread from person to person.
- The virus that causes COVID-19 is a new coronavirus that has spread throughout the world.
- COVID-19 symptoms can range from mild (or no symptoms) to severe illness.



Know how COVID-19 is spread

- You can become infected by coming into close contact (about 6 feet or two arm lengths) with a person who has COVID-19. COVID-19 is primarily spread from person to person.
- You can become infected from respiratory droplets when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks.
- You may also be able to get it by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it, and then by touching your mouth, nose, or eyes.



Protect yourself and others from COVID-19

- There is currently no vaccine to protect against COVID-19. The best way to protect yourself is to avoid being exposed to the virus that causes COVID-19.
- Stay home as much as possible and avoid close contact with others.
- Wear a cloth face covering that covers your nose and mouth in public settings.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, or use an alcoholbased hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.



Practice social distancing

- Buy groceries and medicine, go to the doctor, and complete banking activities online when possible.
- If you must go in person, stay at least 6 feet away from others and disinfect items you must touch.
- Get deliveries and takeout, and limit in-person contact as much as possible.



Prevent the spread of COVID-19 if you are sick

- Stay home if you are sick, except to get medical care.
- Avoid public transportation, ride-sharing, or taxis.
- Separate yourself from other people and pets in your home.
- There is no specific treatment for COVID-19, but you can seek medical care to help relieve your symptoms.
- If you need medical attention, call ahead.



Know your risk for severe illness

- Everyone is at risk of getting COVID-19.
- Older adults and people of any age who have serious underlying medical conditions may be at higher risk for more severe illness.


